

*C*elebrate Labour Day by asking: What strategic steps can we take together to rebuild a province that works for working people?

Pieces of legislation have damaged our ability to represent our members and bargain fair collective agreements; the provincial finances have fallen from a surplus position in 2007 to two consecutive deficit budgets and resulted in cut-backs and challenges for public sector workers at the bargaining table.

At the May 4, 2010 All-Presidents' meeting, it was determined that a comprehensive strategy for addressing these issues must be developed to inform and engage our membership as well as to design a fight back strategy for regaining our rights.
